

The beginning: A Community Food Plan

A community food plan is a holistic approach to improving the food system, promoting food security and sustainability and fostering community health and well being.

By addressing a range of issues related to food accesss, nutrition, and agriculture, a community food plan can help create a more resilient and equitable food system for all residents.





Governments must put into place programs and policies that support the agricultural economy and the future of food sovereignty in their communities and regions.

In the past 50 years, innovation in agriculture has brought tremendous benefits to producers, processors and consumers.

Recent successful innovations include AI assisted livestock feeding operations and the adoption of no-till farming but the need for sustainable innovation in the agri-food sector is pressing.

Reports by the Agriculture Institute of Canada and the Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development have found that Canada's support for agricultural innovation **ranks seventh globally** at 0.046 per cent of GDP. Private-sector investment has also declined, with Canada **ranking 25th** globally down from a high at 18th place in 2008.



About the Inuvik Greenhouse

- Initially a hockey arena part of the Grollier Hall residential school.
- Repurposed in 1999 – this summer marks 25 years of gardening!
- Most Northern commercial and community greenhouse in North America.
- Operational April–September.
- Over 170 plots for community members and commercial growing.

How we operate

- Members can rent plots.
- We also have market plots.
- Annual plant sale to supply plants.
- Hydroponics unit for year-round growing *currently on pause*.
- Supply food through markets, partnerships with stores, and donations to food bank.


